

## Connections :-

THOMAS CROMWELL to ROBERT E. LEE.

All researchers know that the normal sources of information concerning lineal ancestors soon dries up, and one has to go hunting in obscure byways

Wife's families, Brothers and sisters of Wives families, Geographical areas are all straws to be grasped.

In one adventure down an ancestral bywater I found connections between Thomas Cromwell who was chief adviser to King Henry 8, and Robert E. Lee. of fame in the American Civil War. The story is worth relating as it shows that no small, trivial, or apparently irrelevant fact should be ignored

My story begins in 1523 with the Will of Walter Taverner of North Weald Bassett in Co Essex:

He left goods, and money to his children Katherine, John, Ralf, Alice, Jane and Walter

He mentions Margaret Taverner

His brother Andrew Taverner

His wife Alice

He mentions his 'House' in the Parish of Roxwell, Essex.

His Executor was John Colyne of Writtle

Next, in 1552, we have the will of John Taverner of Theydon Garnon, co Essex  
 He mentions Brother Walter of Hatfield  
 Brother Ralf of Hemingham  
 He has a mistress, 'Mystress Branche'.  
 His mother-in-law is named Wyberd.

He left money to his Brother George Raynesford  
 He mentioned brothers John Glascocke of  
 Stanford Rivers and a brother ... Maynard  
 He mentioned his father-in-law  
 John Wiberd of Copersale.

His 4 children were Christopher  
 Jane, Johanne & Katherine.

John was obviously the son of  
Walter Taverner

Leaving Walter and John let me  
 introduce Rycharde Taverner, born in  
 Norfolk in 1505, Rycharde became a clerk  
 of the signet to King Henry 8, and  
 High Sheriff of Oxfordshire. Oliver Cromwell,  
 Earl of Essex was Rycharde's benefactor  
 and close friend. Rycharde's is a  
 fascinating story in itself, however that,  
 another day. Rycharde married twice,  
 his second wife was Mary Harcourt  
 of the famed Harcourts of Stanton  
 Harcourt, they married about 1565.

Rycharde and Mary had two children  
 Harcourt, and Penelope. Penelope  
 Taverner married Robert Petit  
 and had a daughter Mary. Mary  
 Petit married Thomas Wood.

Thomas and Mary had a son Anthony Wood, the Antigarian.

When Rycharde died in 1575 Mary remarried in about 1577 to a Cromwell hee. Cromwell hee was a godson of Thomas Cromwell

Anthony Wood, in Athene Oxoniense mentions Cromwell hee who was obviously quite a character. I can do no better than quote him in full:-

By Anthony Wood.

CROMWELL LEA a younger Son of Sir Anth. Lea or Lee of Burston in Bucks, Knight, (by his Wife the Daughter of Sir Thomas Wyat Knight,) descended from the Lees of Quarendon in the said County, was educated in all inferior Arts in this University, and afterwards travelling and spending several Years in Italy, he attained to so great knowledge in the common Language of that Country, that at his return he wrote,

A Dictionary in Italian and English.—Which tho' it reaches but to the Word Tralingnato, and so consequently wanteth the following Letters to the end of the Alphabet, yet it is as big as a Church-Bible. This Book the Author giving in MS. to the Library of St. John's Coll. in this University, (of which Coll. he had been sometimes a Commoner, about its first Foundation,) the Society did so highly value it, that one of them named Tho. Poticarie, M. of A. and Bach. of the Civil Law, did transcribe it in a very fair Character. Which being so done, it was repos'd in their Library as a choice thing, and is at this day among the printed Books, B. 31. This Crom. Lea, who had married Mary, the Relict of Rich. Taverner, mentioned under the Year 1575, died at his House in Holywell, in the Suburb of Oxon, about the beginning of Winter in sixteen hundred and one, but where buried I know not. Whereupon this Epitaph was made on him by an Oxford Scholar,

Here lieth old Cromwell,  
Who, living, lov'd the Bum well.  
When he dy'd he gave nothing to the poor,  
But half to his Bastards, and half to his Whore.

Thomas Cromwell's Titles included :—

Earl of Essex  
KT of Poyning Seal  
KT of the Soter  
Viceroy General  
Earl Chamberlain

A pedigree exists of the family of LEE, showing the lineal descent of the late General Robert E. Lee. of Virginia from Sir John Lee, Knt. This was published in Miscellanea Genealogica et Heraldica.

In it Cromwell Lee is mentioned as the 4<sup>th</sup> son of Anthony Lee, and Mary Wyatt. Cromwell Lee's brother, Robert had a daughter, who married Edward, Eldest son of Hercules Raynsford of Great Teue Co Oxford.

So from Rycharde Tawernet we connect to Edward Raynsford, and from Walter Tawernet we connect to George Raynesford.

Can we now connect Edward to George?

In the Raynsford Pedigree is noted that "George Rainsford married Katherine, da. of ---- Tawernet of ~~co Essex~~. Confirmation of the connection with Walter Tawernet which Katherine Raynsford was his daughter.

George and Katherine Raynsford had children, Richard, Hercules, John, and Henry.

Georges eldest brother was Sir William Raynsford, whose children included Hercules, Lord of Teue Magna.

So the connections are made between Rycharde Taverner and Walter Taverner and from Thomas Cromwell and Robert E. Lee.

#### Further Connections :-

William Rainsford was high Sheriff of Bucks & Oxfordshire 1461

Rycharde Taverner was high Sheriff of Oxfordshire 1562 to 1575

Robert Lee, George's Grandfather was sheriff of Bucks 1521 & 1533.

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Will of John Tavener of Theydon Garnon, 1552

In the name of God Amen.

The 16th day of the monethe of August in the yere of our lord God M vC LII o (1552) and in the Sixt yere of the Raigne of our most Dread Soferaign Lord Edward the Sixt, by the grace of God of England, Fraunce and Ireland King, Defender of the Faith, and of the Church of England and also of Ireland the Supreme heade.

I, John Tavener of Theydon Garnon in the Countie of Essex, yeoman, beyng of perfitt mynd and memory, Make this my present testament and last will in manner and Forme following.

Fyrst I bequeth my Soule to the mercy of Almyghtie God, And my body to be buryed in Christian buriall.

Item, I geve in recompence of my tythes to the parson 3s 4d.

Item, I geve to the poore mens boxe, for the behoufe of the poore, 5s.

Item, I geve to my brother Walter Tavener of Hatfeld the £10 which my brother Rafe Tavener of Hemingham doth owe me, and yf my said brother Walter Tavener fortune to die afore I departe, then I will the same £10 to be equally devyded emong his Chyldren.

I geve to my brother Raffes Children 20s a pece.

I geve to my godsonne John Raynsford 20s.

Item, to my syster Johanne Pyck 20s, and to my goddawghter her daughter 3s 4d, and to all other godchyldeyn 12d a pece.

I geve to my Mystry, Mystry Branche, my best gray colte.

To my mother Wyberd, my baye gelding.

To my syster Maynard, a gowne.

Item, I give to the mending of the highewayes 40s.

Item, I geve to my poor Neighbourys underwritten, that ys to say, Symond Raynold, Frauncys Newman, Grenes children, Father Wood, Deryng widdowe, Johanne Carter, Thomas Runnyngton, Patches wyfe, mother Munday, Richard Martyns Chyldren, and to mother Sparowe, and to every one of them, one busshell of wheate, and to the Poultar a busshell.

Item, to Johanne Leonard my mayd 3s 4d.

Item, to Thomas Tanner my boye I geve 2 bease [beasts].

Item, to Agnes Yong a Cowe, 2 payer of Sheetes and £10 in money.

Item, I give to Kateryne my daughter £20, to be delyveryd her att the day of her mariage.

Which Kateryne, with her £20, I will my brother George Raynsford to have, he to bring upp unctuously my sayd dawghter, and to Invest the sayd £20 to the most advauntage for her behoufe, and I give to him for his paynes therein Taken fyfty Shelinges.

Item, I geve to my dawghter Johanne £20, to be delyveryd her at the daye of her mariage.

Which Johanne, with her £20, I will my brother John Glascocke of Stanford Ryners to have the governaunce of her, and he lykewyse unctuously to bring her uppe, and her sayd £20 to occupye to the moost advauntage for her behoufe, and I geve him for his paynes with her, fyfty shelinges.

Item, I geve to Jane my daughter £20, which shalbe delyveryd to her at the day of her mariage.

Which Jane, with her £20, I will my father in lawe John Wiberd of Copersale to have, to bring her uppe unctuously and to use her £20 to the moost advauntage for her behoufe, and he to have for his paynes 50s.

Provydred alwayes, that yf it fortune any of my said daughters to dye before the day of her mariage, that then I will her parte So deceasyd to be equallye devyded amone my other daughters, then lyving, and that to be delyveryd to here behoufe Immediately after any of there deceasys,

And yf they all Fayle afore there daye of mariage, then I wyll there hole legaces of £60 to Remayne to Chrystopher my Sonne.

Item. I will all my howsehould stufte shalbe equally devyded among my 4 Children.

Item. I geve to Christopher my Sonne my farme callyd Garnoshe Myll and all the terme of yeres therein, with all the stocke and store thereupon, which Christopher I make Executor of this my testament and last will,

And I will that my brother Maynard have the Ordering and bringyng upp of my sayd Sonne during his nonage, and I give him for his paynes 50s.

The Resydewe of all my goodes and dettes, my dettes being payd, my will Fulfilled, and my sayd Farme well and sufficiently Stocked, I will be equally devydyd emong my 4 Children.

And where [whereas] my sayd Sonne ys nowe in his minoritie and nonage, I will that my brother Maynard and my brother Glascocke shall have the kepyng and occupying of my sayd farme and the Stock thereupon, to the use and behoufe of Christopher my Sonne, duryng his nonage and to such tyme as he shall come to his Full age of 21 yeres.

And that yerely they do make there accompt of all the Renewes [revenues] and profittes to my brother Raynsford, my father in lawe Wyberd, and my neighbure Thomas Shingleton, all which revnewes and profittes I will to be devyded among my 4 children, as my brother Raynsford, my father Wiberd, my brother Glascocke and my brother Maynard shall thinke moost best,

And my will ys, that all Reasonable charges shalbe alowed att all tymes in the sayd accompt,

And yf it fortune my Sonne Christopher to dye before he shall come to the age of 21 yeres, and withoute Issue of his body lawfully begotten, then I will his parte to be equally devyded emong his sistres then lyving, So that my brother Maynard and my brother Glascocke shall thene occupye my sayd farme, and all the stocke thereupon, to the use of my sayd daughters during the terme of yeres therein, and yerely to make there accompt to there behoufe,

And yf all my Chyldren dye withoute Issue, then I will that all my goodes shalbe equally devydyd Emong my brothers and sistres chyldren by the discretyon of my brother Glascocke, my brother Maynard, my father in lawe Wibard and my brother Raynsford, my Overseers,

And fynally I will that my brother Maynard and my brother Glascocke shall have th'administracion of my goodes during the nonage of my Sonn, and they to pay my dettes and Fulfull the legaces of my wyll, and to make there accompte thereof to him at his Full age.

These being witnes, Gerad Michell, clerke, Thomas Shingleton, with other.



Joane, daughter of William Lee of Burston,<sup>3</sup> Quarrendon, and Hartwick, his second wife, second daughter of Sir Thomas Peniston, Lord Cop of Banbury, co. Oxon, M.P. Received a grant of arms from Thomas of Hawridge, co. Bucks, Knt. (by Alice, daughter of Richard Bulstrode gent., by Joane, one of the Wriothesley and Thomas Bentall 18 April 1513; Knt. of Hedingley, co. Bucks, Esq.), and widow of Robert Knollys of daughters of John Spencer of the Body to Henry VIII, and Sheriff of Bucks in Nether Winchendon, co. Bucks, Esq. She married, thirdly, Sir Thomas Tresham of Rushton, co. Northampton, Knt., subsequently appointed Lord Prior of the Knights of St. John. Her will, made 23 June 1557, was proved 11 June 1558. Second wife.

Sir John Clerke, Knt. — Jane Lee. Died 19 Oct. 1516. Buried at Quarrendon, co. Oxon. Died 5 April 1539. Buried in Thame Church. Altar-tomb remaining. (For Pedigree see 'History of Thame Church,' by Rev. Dr. LEE, p. 309. London MITCHELL and HUGHES ; folio, 1883.)

Henry Lee, son and heir, Lord of Quarrendon, Knt. — Anne, third daughter of William, first Lord Paget, K.G., of Beaumarston, and Burston. Born at Allington Castle, co. Kent, in 1531. M.P. for Bucks 1557, 1558, and 1571, 1572. Page of Honour to King Henry VIII. Knighted in 1553. Master of the Ordnance to Queen Elizabeth. A Privy Councillor. Knight of the Garter 1597. Lieutenant of the Manor and Park of Woodstock. Died at Spelsbury, co. Oxon, in 1610.<sup>6</sup> Buried in St. Peter's, Quarrendon.

Margaret, daughter of Burston aforesaid. Educated at St. John's College, Oxf. — Anne of Sir Henry Wyatt of Allington Castle, co. Kent, and sister of Sir Thomas Wyatt the poet. First wife.

Russell Lee. Letters of administration granted to his brother Richard 23 Dec. 1569.

Sir Richard Lee, Knt., M.P. for Woodstock. Died sine prole of a knight named Hall ; his second, Lady Croker of Hook Norton.

Thomas Lee, son. Died in 1573. Letters of administration granted to his brother Richard 22 Dec. 1608. Will dated 1 Oct. 1608 ; proved 23 Jan. 1608-9. Robert Lee, third — Jane, daughter of Edward Westwold of The Vache, Aston Clinton, co. Bucks, and widow of Sir Francis Hastings of Penwick, Knt. Will dated 27 Jan. 1597-8 ; proved 30 June 1598.

Edward, eldest son of Hercules Raynsford, of Great Tew, co. Oxon, Esq. Dorothy Lee, only daughter and heiress of her father.




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

## Further Connections :-

Cromwell Lee's step-brother was Sir Richard Lee M.P. for Woodstock.

He was a military engineer, and is credited with the restoration of the fortifications of Calais & Boulogne.

King Henry VIII rewarded Richard with a number of estates, including St. Albans & they, and in 1544 the manor of Hexton. Probably an absent landlord, Sir Richard gradually sold off the Hexton Estates, but kept the lordship of the Manor. His daughter married Edward Sadler, and in 1591 Henry Sadler transferred the manor to William Brand and Henry Kinge.

In 1593 they sold it to Peter Taverner, the stepson of Mary Taverner, widow of Richard Taverner and on her second marriage wife of Cromwell Lee.

## More Further Connections

Mary's first husband, Richard Taverner, Clerk of the signet to King Henry Henry VIII was at one time paid £333 as wages for the soldiers of Boulogne, where Sir Richard Lee was restoring the fortifications.

Like Sir Richard Lee, Edmund Taverner, grandson of Richard Taverner became M.P. for Woodstock in 1626.
