

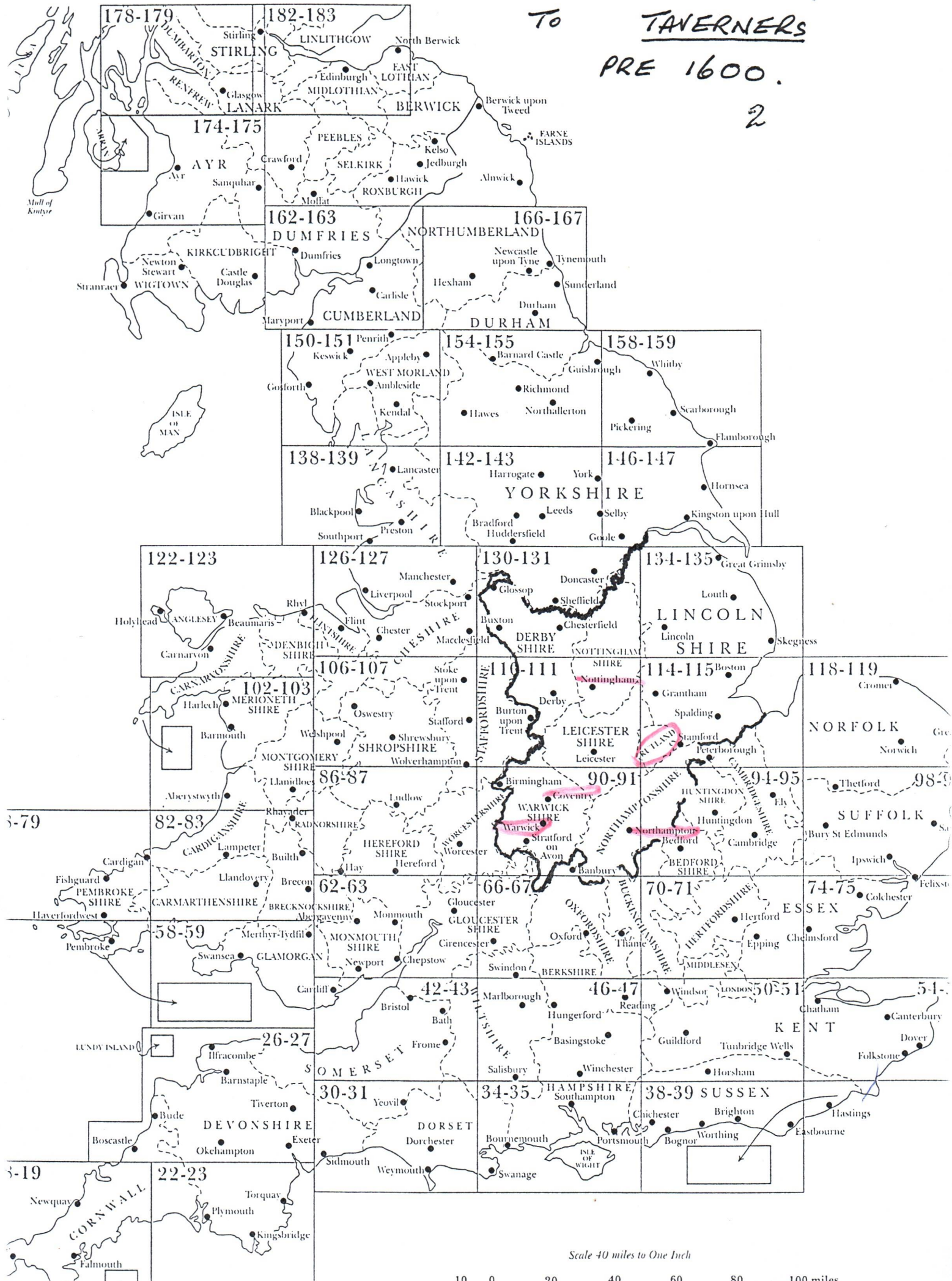

Request that he will cause restitution to be made to William de Tollere, merchant of Grymesby, who complains that whereas his men loaded a ship with corn and victuals to the value of £300 sterling in Estlang, which was wrecked on her voyage to England in the port of Kalnesounde near Malestronde in Norway; whereupon William Barel, the master, agreed with Her Peterdire, the said king's bailiff of Malestronde, and Eric Gunnoressione to carry the goods on shore and keep them for his use, but they carried them away by force, and imprisoned the servants of the ship for a year and a half: and that he will cause amends to be made for the said William Toller's damages, and that he will release Geoffrey le Taverner of Grymesby, the bearer of the king's former letter, whom he has committed to hard prison. He is to write back by the bearer hereof what he has done in this matter.

The king declares that the bishop and the dean and chapter of Lincoln shall out of the next aid to be granted by the clergy of the province of Canterbury, if it be on this side Easter, collect and receive the said sum of 900 marks in the diocese of Lincoln in satisfaction of the loan; but if there shall be no grant made by the clergy before that feast, or if the money collected shall not be equivalent to the said sum, then execution shall forthwith issue upon the recognisance, notwithstanding any protection or immunity granted to the above-named persons.

Order to arrest the goods and merchandise of the men of the town of St Omer to the value of £200, and to keep the same safely until Hugh le Tygheler of Lincoln, merchant, have been satisfied for that sum, or until further orders, certifying the king of the goods arrested by them, the king having frequently written to the mayor and échevins of that town to cause payment of the above sum to be made to Hugh, who complained to the king that he delivered £200 sterling to William Bondeleti, changer of that town, to exchange, so that William should pay them to Hugh at London in like money at Whitsuntide in the 15th year of the king's reign [30 May 1322], and that the mayor and échevins of that town mainperned for William for all things touching the exchange, and that William secretly left the town without satisfying Hugh; to which the mayor and échevins replied that Hugh had delivered the said money to the said William their changer, and that they were bound to Hugh for payment thereof, and that they would pay him the same together with his damages in honour of the king; but, as they desired to defer payment for a long time, the king afterwards requested them to satisfy Hugh for the said sum and his damages without delay, so that it might not behove the king to provide another remedy for Hugh; and the letters containing this request were delivered to the mayor and échevins by Walter le Taverner of Lincoln, by whom Hugh sent the letters, when the mayor and échevins scorned and tore the said letters, and did nothing in response, as appears by the letters testimonial of the mayor and community of Lincoln; wherefore Hugh has prayed the king to provide him with a remedy.

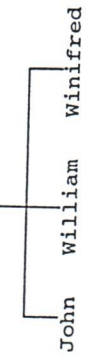

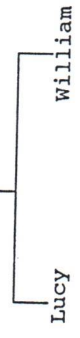

Order to take Walter le Taverner of Newerk, John le Taverner chaplain, Ralph le Taverner clerk, Richard le Taverner taillour, Richard de Tyryngton, Richard de Boxworth taverner, John Joudas, William Barbour the elder, Alan de Burton, Nicholas le Taverner, Henry de Burbrig, William fitz Piers of Newerk, Adam Chyne, John Skynner, Geoffrey de Tilneye chaplain, Stephen Pope and Robert de Northwell carter, and keep them safely in prison so that they be not delivered thence without the king's special order; and to take an inquisition concerning those who have gone armed with the said Walter &c., and have made illicit assemblies and gatherings against the form of the statute of Northampton and against the peace of the said king; and to take all those who shall be found guilty of the premises and cause them to be safely kept in prison so that they shall not be released from the same until the king orders otherwise; as the king lately ordered the statute of Northampton to be proclaimed in all the counties of England by the sheriffs of those counties, and now he has learned that the said Walter, &c., despising that statute, joining together and going armed, having joined themselves with several other armed malefactors, lying in wait in the high road at Marcolmbrigges near Newerk for the jurors of the country and other of the king's lieges of those parts, who were lately present for gaol delivery at Nottingham, took several of the king's lieges returning by that way, threw them to the ground from their horses, beat, wounded, imprisoned and ill-treated them so that their life is despaired of, and that the said malefactors daily go armed to perpetrate such evils in the town of Newerk and the neighbouring parts and carry arms in contempt of the king's peace and to the manifest terror of the people of those parts, and contrary to the said statute, without a remedy being applied by the sheriff.

Memorandum, that on Friday after Martinmas [14 November 1315] sir John de Sandale, the chancellor, went from London to Lincoln to attend the election of the dean of St Mary's church, Lincoln, wherein he is a prebendary, and thence to the king in the northern parts, and he left, by the king's order, the great seal under his seal in the custody of sir Adam de Osgodeby to be kept under the seals of sir Robert de Bardelby and sir Robert de Askeby, and to carry the seal to the chancellor at Newwerk, so that in the meantime Adam, Robert and Robert, or two of them, shall execute what pertains to the office of the seal; which Adam and Robert de Askeby opened the said seal on the same day in the chancellor's inn at London after dinner, and sealed writs with the same; and on Sunday after the octaves of the said feast [23 November 1315] Adam and Robert de Askeby at Newwerk delivered the seal under Robert's seal to the chancellor in his inn at the house of Richard le Taverner in that town, in the presence of sir William de Ayremynne, Thomas de Evesham and others and the chancellor opened the seal and sealed writs with it on Monday following [24 November 1315].

Whereas because certain merchants of the realm lent divers sums of money to the king for his affairs, of the sale of their wool sent to Holand and Seland in the king's name, and delivered to Reginald de Conductu and John de la Pole, supplying the place of William de la Pole, deputed to receive it under a certain form, the king promised that to each of the said merchants 20s should be allowed of the 40s, which they were bound to pay as subsidy and custom on each sack of wool taken out of the realm from St Peter ad Vincula next until Michaelmas following [1 August 1338 to 29 September 1338], and the entire custom and subsidy of 40s after that feast until satisfaction had been made to them for the sums due or they had received the king's letters obligatory for what was due to them to be received, one moiety at Easter next [28 March 1339] and the other moiety at Easter following [16 April 1340], as the king should choose, so that each of them should find sufficient security in the port where the wool was laded, before the collectors of customs there, to pay the king or those deputed by him, the remaining 20s on such sacks in parts beyond the sea, within fifteen days after the wool has been unladed, and the king has granted to John le Taverner of Coventry, merchant, to whom he is bound in £212 18s 7d for such wool, received by Reginald and John in parts beyond the sea, that he shall have such allowance for the wool which he shall take out of the port of London during the said time, and orders the said collectors to receive security from him as aforesaid, and to cause allowance to be made to him according to the tenor of the king's letters, and to cause the said letters to be endorsed with the said allowances, provided that he or his attorney shall take oath each time that he takes out wool, that the wool is his own, and that he will not pass the wool of others as his own, or commit any fraud, and the collectors shall receive the subsidy and custom due, when John has been satisfied for the sum due to him.
