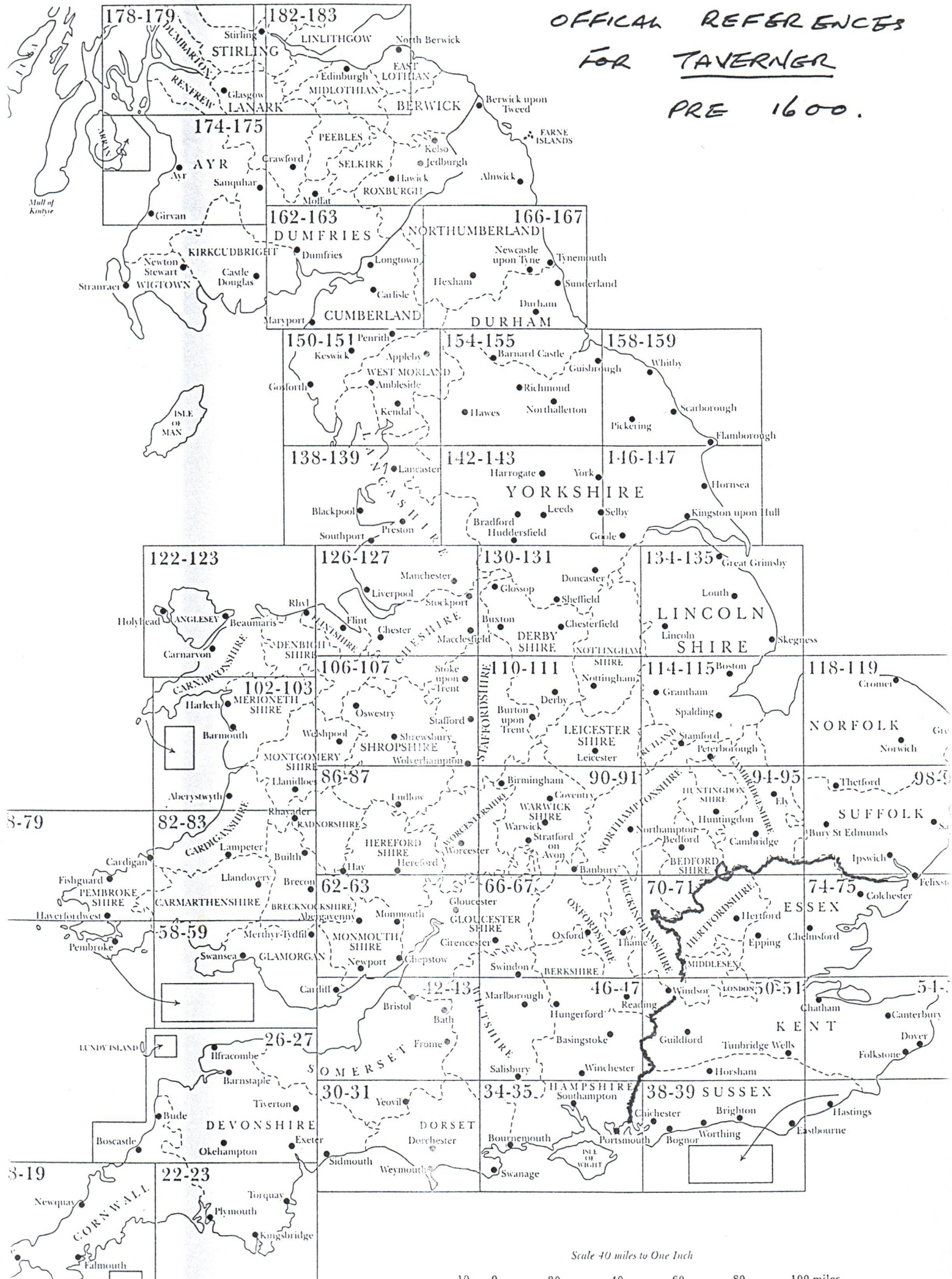

Writ of supersedeas omnino in respect of any process against John Peraunt, lieutenant of John Golafre knight keeper of the islands of Jersey, Gernesey, Serke and Aurney, appointed with others to arrest John Taverner and all his goods, and to put such goods in safe keeping until further order, but order to proceed against others who did meddle therein; as he has made oath in chancery that he executed not that commission, neither meddled in aught therein contained.

## FRANCE

1542

War was Henry 8<sup>th</sup>'s last hopeless attempt to recapture his youth.

On the Continent Emperor Charles, and King Francis of France were at each other's throat and Henry saw this as an opportunity of regaining his lost lands in France which would not rise against him.

July 1 1543 ~~500~~ at Greenwich the Scottish ambassador agreed to a Treaty of Marriage between the infant Queen Mary and Henry's heir Edward.

In the meantime 5000 English troops crossed the channel in preparation for the assault on France. Scotland however

foiled Henry's plans by annulling its agreements with England. In just 10 days in 1544 Henry's army destroyed the Scottish resistance & he was free to go to France.

on 14<sup>th</sup> July 1544 Henry left for Calais and on 15<sup>th</sup> September Boulogne was captured, but Henry did not march on Paris and with his hungry, unpaid troops close to mutiny made peace with France in October 1544. In these last

years of his life Henry spent some 2 million pounds on war.

Monastic lands that Henry had retained were sold off, some £800,000 was raised by the Court of Augmentations between 1542 & 1547.

Now began the great debasement of England's coinage and Henry, probably the richest King in Europe 5 years earlier now had to borrow from the Antwerp money lenders the way to fund taxes, overtook flat iron.

Henry's war destroyed the financial independence of the crown and permanently diminished the authority of England's Kings & Queens.

The Taverners ~~was~~ participated in the war, and benefited from the sale of lands by the Court of Augmentations.

John Balton (or Bolton) vicar of Kyngeston upon Thames and Alexander Bykenore, to John the Thorp and Margaret daughter of Edmund Broke of Aidenham, county Hertford, and to the heirs of their bodies, with remainder to the right heirs of John de Thorp:  
grant and surrender of three messuages, whereof one is a water mill, and of 100 acres of land and 4 acres of meadow in Kyngeston upon Thames and Longediton, reciting a fine levied at Westminster in the quinzaine of Easter 21 Richard II [2 May 1378] of seven messuages, the said land and meadow and of 26s 8d rent there between the said John Balton and Alexander plaintiffs and John Sutton of Kyngeston upon Thames and Joan his wife deforciantis, whereby the plaintiffs acknowledged the right of the said Joan, and the deforciantis granted the same during their own lives to the plaintiffs and to the heirs of John Balton, with remainder to the said John de Thorp and Margaret and to the heirs of their bodies, remainder to the right heirs of the said John de Thorp; and a grant of four of the said messuages and the said rent afterwards made by the said John Balton and Alexander to the said John Sutton and Joan for their lives.

Commission to Roger de la Chaumbre of Kingeston upon Hull and Ralph le Taverner of Noringham of Hull, appointing them during pleasure as wardens and searchers of money in the port of Kingeston upon Hull, so that they answer for the forfeiture thereof at the Exchequer; pursuant to the king's provision, to avoid the loss which could result to the king and realm through the import from foreign parts and the export from the realm of counterfeit money of less value than the king's sterling, that no merchant, alien or denizen, or other person leave or secretly or openly enter the realm with any quantity of money except in the ports of London, Sandwich, Dover, Wynchelse, Southampton, Portesmouth, Bristol, Cuncwei, Berwick upon Tweed, Newcastle upon Tyne, Kyngeston upon Hull, Boston, Lenn, Yarmouth and Ipswich, and that all money to be brought into and taken from the realm be examined by wardens and searchers deputed in those ports and that those who bring any of the king's coinage and lawful sterling be permitted to have the same and to take advantage thereof, and that any not of the king's coinage be arrested and transmitted to the change of London or Canterbury under the seal of the wardens or searchers and by their ministers and those to whom the money belongs, to be struck anew under the king's coinage, and that any such money found concealed be forfeited to the king.

(named with-tenants' names) in Kyngeston, Norbyton in Kyngeston and Talworthe in Longdyton, county Surrey, late of the free chapel of St Mary Magdalene next Kyngeston; and lands (tenant named) in Ham in Kyngeston, late of the monastery of Shene, county Surrey.

Yearly value £18 9s 7d. To hold in fee farm, to wit, in socage as of the manor of Estgrenewiche and at a yearly rent of £18 9s 7d, 20 marks yearly besides to be spent on the maintenance of the school and the master thereof.

Certifies that in the 8th year of Elizabeth [17 November 1565 - 16 November 1566] a commission was directed to divers gentlemen of Somerset to survey what woods of her Majesty were in every forest of her Highness in that county. The return was that her Majesty had no woods to the same forest belonging. Since that time writer had searched all such records as he could find, for any wood-sale or any pavnage within the forest, but found nothing answered for. Had traced certain small ameracements that had been answered, but no such ameracements had been now answered for a long time, except only deer for the household. Sir Henry Portman dwelleth nigh the forest, and probably knows the state thereof.

The importance of supplying Gascony with grain without depleting the home market led English merchants to purchase it as far afield as Prussia, and in this way the Baltic trade was opened up. The greatest commodity for export, however, was English cloth.

Many vintners had their own ships, reaping additional profits from wine freighted for other merchants. The smaller traders took their own ships over and did their own buying, the greater vintners entrusted their affairs to reliable employees. Medieval ships naturally varied greatly in size, but in the late fourteenth and early fifteenth centuries, ships of about 1,000 tons burthen were by no means unusual, while from the mid-fifteenth century there was a universal decline in size throughout Europe until few were more than 200 tons and the majority between 100 and 150 tons. The popularity of small ships in not hard to explain since they needed only a small crew, were quick and easy to load and could enter almost any harbour, however poor, and finally, if sunk, the financial loss was easier to bear.<sup>14</sup> Shipping obviously involved considerable capital outlay. The voyages, too, took a long time since the ships, with no navigational aids except the stars, hugged the shore and called in at ports fairly frequently for supplies. A normal voyage from London, for instance, might involve calls at Sandwich, Southampton, Conquet in Brittany, and Bordeaux. It is for this reason that vintners are frequently found trafficking in other commodities, just as other merchants whose main interest might be in cloth or fish are also found dealing in wine. The Anglo-French wars of the late fourteenth and fifteenth centuries took a heavy toll of English shipping, not only in ships captured or sunk, but in those commandeered by the Crown for transport for its armies or for Channel-keeping duties, because it had very few ships of its own. Thus English shipping declined and the vintners lost not only valuable assets in the ships themselves, but also incurred increasingly heavy freight charges. By the mid-fifteenth century almost all the carrying trade had passed into the hands of aliens who continued to dominate it until the very end of the century. The lack of English ships is well illustrated. For instance, in 1468, David Selly, a London vintner, was accused of contravening a statute of 1382 which laid down that wines should be shipped in English ships only. The previous April he had landed his own wines and those of other merchants in a ship of Zealand and his defence was that when he was in Bordeaux he could find no English ship available.<sup>15</sup>

The city of London records contain many cases of disputes over sales of wine. In 1305, Bernard de la Rochelle (whose name clearly gives his origins, but who must have been a London citizen) was attached to answer Arnold de Teler of Gascony in a plea of trespass. Arnold complained that Bernard had bought from him five casks of wine for £10 in London, taking him to a tavern and paying him 20s. on account. While they were sitting there, he said, Bernard had had the casks loaded and taken away. Bernard defended himself by saying that he had acted merely as a broker on behalf of Adam le Brocher and the latter had given him the 20s. for the advance payment and Arnold had himself made delivery to Adam. A jury from Vintry Ward found that the plaintiff had indeed delivered the wine to Adam and not to Bernard, and it was judged that Arnold gain nothing from his complaint and that Bernard be acquitted. These glimpses into court cases show nothing of the personalities and motives involved, and in this case there is apparently no reason to explain why Arnold brought the action, since on the face of it there seems to be no case at all. This is not, however, true of another legal action in the same year. Richard de Mauncestre and Peter le Taverner charged Peter Bolom that they had bought twelve casks of wine from him for £24, paying him £6 down and security for the remainder. At the time of purchase the wine was so dense and impure that it was unrecognisable by sight and taste, but the defendant had promised them that it was 'of good proof and short assize and would draw well in the end', so the plaintiffs agreed to let him keep it for a week. At the end of that time, they met in London and the defendant promised them that the wine was good and that he would indemnify them if it was not. The plaintiffs took the wine and kept it for a fortnight and found it so corrupt that they asked for their indemnity and were refused. The defendant admitted the sale but claimed the plaintiffs had not paid the remaining £18 as agreed at the time of purchase and that he had sued for it. The plaintiffs said the wine was other than he claimed and sought release from payment. In the sheriff's court the verdict was given against the plaintiffs and they had to pay the defendant his £18. Having lost the suit for debt, Richard and Peter immediately sued for a remedy for the bad wine and this time they won their case.<sup>16</sup>

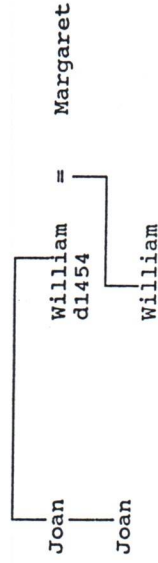

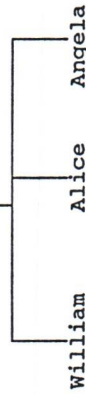
