Law student's in a fray. On Sunday in November John de Glemham, apprentice of the bench (although the student's involved in this affair were not attending Oxford or Cambridge, they may be regarded as essentially university students, for the Inns of the Court --"were not merely law students, for the Inns of the court were not merely law schools, but rather universities where gentlemens sons were trained for public careers, Music, Dancing, History and divinity were studied as well as the law"). Lay dead in a house in the parish of St Bride of Fleete Street, it was learned that on St Martin's eve (Nov 10)@ John-de-Oxford, clerke at the request of William-de-Cornelle went to the Taverner of Edmund Cosyn in the parish of St Bride, where he assaulted John Wolfel, Edmund's Taverner on the ground of an old quarrel. John-de-Wolfel made an outcry whereupon came John-de-Glemham and a number of apprentices of the bench whose names were unknown. In the fray a certain William-le-Taverner struck John-de-Glemham with his sword on the forehead inflicting a wound 4 inches long, 2 1/2 inches deep. Thus wounded John made his way to his chamber where he had his ecclesiastical rights and after lingering until the following Saturday died.

Whereas Thomas de Byndon, Richard Forst', John de Roude, John Flemyng the elder, Henry de Lyme, Thomas de Nesseling, John de Vaus of Southampton, Laurence de Mees, William le Betere, Henry Cole, Leodegarius de Burgoyne, Michael Mone, Nicholas de Mondenard, Robert atte Barre, John le Taverner, John Forest[er] and Lucas Scot, burgesses of Southampton, on Tuesday before the Ascension in the 18th year of the late king's reign [14 May 1325], acknowledged before the said king that they owed to him and Stephen de Abyndon, then his butler, £90, to be paid at Easter next following, as appears by the tenor of the recognizance, which the king has caused to come before him in chancery; and the king, at the petition of the aforesaid men before him and his council in parliament - suggesting that they were compelled by Hugh le Despenser the younger, master Robert de Baldok and Robert de Holden, in the late king's time, to come to Porcestre castle, and to stay there until they had bought 30 tuns of the late king's wines in the castle for £90, at which they were, it is said, appraised, and until they had made a recognizance to the late king and to Stephen, and that the said wines were so putrid that they were worth little or nothing - appointed John de Tycheburn and Ralph de Bereford to make inquisition by the oath of men of county Southampton concerning the premises; and it is found by the inquisition that the aforesaid men were compelled to come to the aforesaid castle and to buy the wine as is aforesaid, and that the wine was rotten and putrid, and that ten tuns of it were worth only £10 and twenty tuns were worth only £10: the king has therefore pardoned the aforesaid men £70 of the aforesaid £90, and orders

Henry bishop of Lincoln, here present, says that he is deputed by letters patent (recited) of William bishop of Norwich, dated Dover, iv ides March 1326 [12 March 1327], executor of Bartholomew de Badlesmere, an adherent of Thomas earl of Lancaster, to claim and receive Bartholomew's goods and keep them in safe custody. He says further that the arrears of the farm of Drayton manor, Sussex, which Alice late the wife of Geoffrey de Pycheford held for life and which after her death ought to have reverted to Bartholomew but was taken into the king's hand because of his forfeiture and committed for a yearly farm to one John le Taverner of Cycestre, pertain to the executors, and asks that John, who is present in court, may pay them £20 of arrears of this farm which he has in his hands and has not yet paid to the king. Being asked if he has this £20, John says he has and is ready to pay them to anyone provided he is quit against the king. He is accordingly directed to pay them to Henry and is thereupon quit.

Ad petitionem Iohannis Tauerner [*at the petition of John Taverner*] and other citizens of **Bristoll** sheweinge to the kinge and his counsell that whereas the earle of Gloucester came before Bristoll with 20,000 men and more and demaunded the same cittie to bee delivered vnto him, which hee (being then maiour) and the other cittizens denied and defended the cittie, whereunto the said earle by the counsell of Hughe Spencer the father and Bartholomewe Badlesmere purchased of the kinge oyer and terminer againste them to bee inquired of att Gloucester contrarye to their liberties of their cittie, and for that they appeared not and the sheriffe retorned falselye non sunt inuenti [*they are not found*], they were outlawed and their lands and goodes seised for the kinge, they praye that yt would please the kinge and his counsell to cause the record and processe to come before them and to comaund the iustices of the kinges bench to reuerse the said outlawrye and to restore them to the common lawe that they maye recouer their lands and goodes.

Responsum est sic:- Habeant breue in cancellario iusticariis de banco regis quod procedant in processu coram eisdem iusticiariis super premissis habito, et si error inueniatur in recordo et processu vtlagarie predictae, tunc errorem illum corrigi faciant.

*It is answered thus:- They may have a writ in chancery to the justices of the King's Bench that they may proceed in the process had before the said justices upon the premises, and if an error be found in the record and process of outlawry aforesaid, then they shall have that error corrected.*

was it only taverners who committed this particular offence, for in 1355, a fine of 10s. was paid to the Exchequer on behalf of William Doget, vintner, who sold twenty gallons of red wine for more than 6d. per gallon. The Dogets were a prominent vintner family and William was probably the father of Walter Doget who was master of the Mistery in 1370.<sup>28</sup>

1330

There were constant proceedings over the question of allowing customers to see their wine drawn. In May 1350, Roger Torold, taverner, and Bartholomew, the taverner of Nicholas le Blake, were charged with refusing this freedom to one of their customers, John Cortoys. They both admitted their guilt and were committed to prison until they could pay the City Chamberlain a fine of half a mark each. The record does not say whether the court investigated the reason for their offence and found that they were perhaps selling cheap wine for good or old wine for new. It was obviously a regulation the taverners resented, although it is difficult to see why unless they intended sharp practice. Twenty years previously, the entire Vintners' Mistery had been fined twenty marks for refusing to let customers see their wine drawn, and it was proclaimed that all their measures had to have the aldermanic seal indicating that they held the right amount. The affair seems to have started with a heavy influx of wine into the city, leading to a proclamation by the authorities that the best Gascon wine was to be reduced in price to 4d. per gallon and reiterating the regulation about customers seeing it drawn. The result was that the taverners closed ranks and shut their doors, refusing to sell the wine at all. On hearing this the mayor and sheriff went through the middle of Vintry and Cheap Wards (the two wards with the greatest number of taverns) discovering if it were true and taking the names of offenders. At least thirty taverners, including two women and John de Oxford, already the alderman of Vintry Ward and later to be both mayor and sheriff himself, were named. The mayor then summoned twelve of the best men from each ward and requested them to hold an inquisition into the affair. They found that not only had all the taverners closed their doors and refused to sell their wine, but that at least two of them, Hikeman le Taverner of Smithfield and Reginald de Thorpe, had been selling wine behind locked doors at the old prices, and that John de Oxford and thirty-two others . . . The record remains unfinished and it is from another source that the corporate fine is known.<sup>29</sup>

The most serious offence by taverners was the adulteration of wine. In 1419 a proclamation was issued against counterfeit romeney (a wine



similar to malmsey) which as a sweet wine was expensive. The proclamation sets out the kind of adulteration very vividly and is therefore worth giving in full. Because, it declared, 'for some time both English and aliens, to the common harm of all and the scandal of the city, have been putting wine of Spain and Rochelle and other remnants of broken, sodden, reboiled and unthrifty wine of other countries, which are enfeebled in colour and nothing in value, in various butts and other vessels that are scraped to make resin adhere, gummed with pitch, cobblers' wax and other horrible and unwholesome things in order to reduce and bring again a pleasant colour and a likely manner drinking of Romeneye to smell and taste, to the deceit of all. And not only to put an end to this practice, but also to remedy the great multitude of such wines deceptively counterfeited and meddled with abroad and brought here to sell, called Romeneye, but counterfeited of Spanish and Rochelle, the mayor and aldermen now ordain that no-one within the city or liberties is to sell a gallon of such counterfeited wine on pain of having all his wine and vessels forfeited, and no-one is to meddle with wine in any way, no white with red, old with new, whole with broken or corrupt, Rhenish with Rochelle, or any different kind of growths together on pain of the pillory. Also no cooper or anyone else within the city is to gum, scrape, bind (barrels) or anything else concerned with counterfeiting on pain of the pillory. To ensure obedience to the ordinance, any man who can inform the city Chamberlain of someone breaking it is to have one-third of the forfeited wine.'<sup>30</sup>

This proclamation is immediately followed in the City Letter Book by the sentencing to the pillory of one William Horold, cooper, for selling romeney in the parish of St. Martin in the Vintry by gumming and scraping two butts with various gums to make old, feeble Spanish wine smell and taste like romeney, and colouring it with powdered bay and other things. In June 1457, Austyn Cassyn was charged with having, in 1454 and with the aid of Richard Cok, cooper, 'falseley and deceivably counterfeited, coloured, dubbed and meddied vi pipes of white Rochelle, wine old and feeble of colour and taste thin, in the cellar of the said Austyn, with red wine called "Trent" (a Spanish wine, dark in colour) and with eggs, alum gum and other horrible and unwholesome things for to induce and bring again a pleasant colour to the sight and likely manner drinking of red wine to the tarrage (appearance) smell and taste of the people.' Whether Austyn was convicted is not recorded. Adulteration was not a fifteenth century innovation, there are many earlier



instances; for example in November 1364 John Rightways and John Penrose were accused, not of counterfeiting, but of selling unsound and unwholesome red wine in the tavern of Walter Doget in St. Leonard Eastcheap for which they had been committed to Newgate. The four searchers of wine for the city investigated the matter and found Rightways not guilty and Penrose guilty. The court then judged that Penrose should drink the unsound wine he had sold and have the rest poured over his head. He was also to be expelled from the Mistery of the Vintners, which meant in effect that he could no longer keep a tavern, and he was not readmitted for five years.<sup>31</sup>

There is not a great deal of evidence in existence about individual taverns at this period, but one or two instances may perhaps serve as illustrations. All taverns were bound to keep the curfew, closing their doors for trade at 9 p.m. when the bells of St. Mary le Bow, All Hallows by the Tower, St. Bride's and St. Giles Cripplegate sounded the curfew. From then until 6 a.m. the city gates were shut, business was suspended and respectable persons stayed indoors. On 24 December 1318, Thomas Drinkwater, taverner of London, leased to James Barfleur, citizen and vintner, a tavern in the parish of St. Olave, Southwark, which Thomas had recently built at the end of London Bridge (identified as the 'Bear at the Bridge foot', a famous house of entertainment from the fourteenth to the sixteenth centuries), to hold it for six years in return for the sum which James had previously advanced to Thomas for the improvement of the tavern. Thomas was to provide hanaps or handled mugs, both of wood and silver, and the curtains and cloths the tavern still required. He also agreed to sell the wine already broached in the tavern and to give James an account of the sale. This is obviously not an average type of lease by any means, but interesting because it appears to initiate the successful career of one of London's most famous taverns. In December 1453, Sir Nicholas Sturgeon appeared in the City Chamber and filed a debt of £12.13s.4d. against Thomas Guy, vintner, who was in arrears with his rent for the 'Paul's Head', a tavern near St. Paul's Cheyne. The defendant made four defaults on payment and finally his goods were seized and valued so that Sir Nicholas might receive his money.<sup>32</sup>

Although primarily engaged in the import and wholesale trade, merchant vintners were also engaged in retail distribution. Many leased taverns or retailed directly from their homes and it was common practice to employ a taverner. Taverners rarely had the capital to buy more than a few casks of wine at a time from the importers in the spring and autumn,



and it was quite common for vintners to stock the cellars of taverners who could not afford to buy outright and who were in much the same position therefore as the landlord of today's tied house. In 1311, Edward II, in an attempt 'to amend the dearness of wine in the City', had issued a writ which among other things had forbidden any wholesale dealer in wine to be a taverner under penalty of losing his wine. This regulation, not unnaturally, must have led to an increase of partnerships between dealers and taverners.<sup>33</sup> Nor do the partnerships seem to have been concealed. In the few court cases already cited, Bartholomew in 1350 was described as the taverner of Nicholas de Blake, and John Rightways and John Penrose sold wine in the tavern of Walter Doget.

In the years that followed the 1364 charter to the Vintners' Mistery, several ordinances were issued by the mayor, aldermen and common council giving the vintners' searchers extra powers, and in 1377 their number was increased to six good men of the Mistery of Vintners, and by 1428 that number had been doubled to twelve. In 1427 Henry VI confirmed the charter, but it was not until ten years later, on 23 August 1437, that the mistery was formally incorporated. It thereby received the right to elect four masters or wardens annually, who were to rule the Company, the right to own corporately lands and other property in London worth £20 per annum, the right of using a common seal, of pleading in courts and conducting business under the name of the Masters and Wardens of the Company and Mistery of Vintners of London. The rents from the property were to be used not only for the support of the poor of the craft, but also for a chaplain to say mass daily for the welfare of the king while he lived and for his soul after death (Henry VI was a very pious man but a weak king and was later to be deposed and murdered), for the souls of the king's ancestors and for the welfare and souls of the vintners.<sup>34</sup> The incorporation was followed in 1447 by a grant of arms to the Company (see Appendix E). Like the 1364 charter, that of 1437 in some instances merely formalised existing customs. The Mistery had, for a long time past, elected four masters or wardens. In 1416, for instance, the four Masters of the Vintners were enjoined by the city authorities to assemble their company and make known to them that they were not to sell red or white wine at a dearer price than 8d. per gallon or any sweet wine dearer than 12d. on pain of forfeiture of their vessels and imprisonment.<sup>35</sup>

The Vintners seem to have been stirred into obtaining their grant of incorporation by Richard Meryvale, a vintner who made his will at the beginning of April 1437. In it he left to his executors, all of them vintners,

1. the tenor of a plea before William de Shareshull and his fellows, late justices of oyer and terminer in the county of Suffolk, held at Ipswich in 18 Edward III [25 January 1344 - 24 January 1345], Suffolk, to wit.

John son of Alexander le Bouer was attached to answer Alan Fouke of St Edmunds touching a plea wherefore he broke his close at St Edmunds, fished in his stank there and carried away fish. Alan, by his attorney, John Gamen, complains that John, on Sunday after St Matthias in that year [29 February 1344] broke his close, fished in his stank and caarried away fish, to wit eels to the value of 40s. Whereupon the abbot of St Edmunds, by his attorney, Henry de Ernested, says that Henry I, by charter which he produces, granted to the then abbot that no secular person or other minister of the king should intermeddle with the borough of St Edmunds or the men abiding therein but only the abbot and convent and their ministers, that Edward II inspected and confirmed this charter by a charter whereby he granted to Richard, then abbot, and the convent that she should for ever have cognisance of all pleas affecting as well the abbot as the men and tenants emergent within the borough, except pleas affecting the person of the king, and he produces a charter to that effect, dated at Kenilworth, 20 April 9 Edward II [1316]. Wherefore he claims his liberty of having cognisance of this plea.

He produces also a writ close, dated 14 February 18 Edward III [1344], commanding the said justices on view of the charter to permit the abbot to enjoy such liberties as were contained therein.

And upon this the abbot being asked to shew that he or any predecessor was put in seisin of the liberty says that the liberty was allowed before William de Bereford and his fellows, jusyices of the Bench, at Westminster in 8 Edward II [8 July 1314 - 7 July 1315], in a plea between Amabel daughter of Hugh le Taverner, and Emma, Sarah and Alice her sisters, demandants, and William de Merlawe, tenant, of a messuage in the suburb of St Edmunds, and he produces letters patent, dated 2 March 18 Edward III [1344], exemplifying the tenor of the record of that plea, and Alan and John have nothing to say wherefore the abbot should not have his liberty. Wherefore it is adjudged that he have his liberty in that plea. And his said attorney appointed a day for the parties before the bailiffs of the abbot at St Edmunds, on Friday the feast of St Gregory the pope [12 March 1344].

Tenor of an allowance whereof mention is made in a bill attached to this roll before William de Shareshull and his fellows, justices, as follows:-

Suffolk, to wit. The sheriff was commanded to summon here eighteen men of the borough of St Edmunds to enquire of what shall be enjoined on them by the justices for the king. The sheriff now returns that he has charged Ralph de Bockyng, steward of the liberty of St Edmunds, who has the return of all writs and precepts within the liberty, and he had answered with a panel of the names of eighteen jurors, to wit Robert de Ereswell, John Osbern, Ralph le Taliour, Philip de Clopton, Michael Scabayle, Robert de Pastone, Michael atte Pyrie, Walter Sparewe, Ralph le Bocher, Alexander de Westle, Richard de Waton, Adam le Organistre, John de Bovyngton, Walter de Bekenham, Edmund Aylewy, Hervey de Westle, Robert de Beketon, and Edmund le Iremongere, and this panel the sheriff returned before the justices and they were told to take the oath. And upon this the abbot comes by his said attorney to claim his liberties as granted by the charter of Henry I aforesaid and produces a charter dated at Woodstock, 22 July 4 Edward III [1330], to the justices to allow the liberties if on view of the charter they find them contained therein. Wherefore it is adjudged that he have the said liberty and the men nominated on the panel are told to go quietly from the court without making oath or any other thing there.

Tenor of the bill aforesaid:-

Pleas of juries and assizes before Salomon de Roffa, Walter de Horptone, Richard de Bilund and their fellows, justices in eyre at Ipswich, county Suffolk, the morrow of All Souls 14/15 Edward I [3 November 1286]. The hundred of Rysebregge comes by twelve. The jury present that that liberty is the liberty of the abbot of St Edmunds and he haas in the same liberty eight and a half hundreds with all liberties pertaining to those hundreds and in the same heclaims to have returns of writs, estreats, summonses, and he claims that the same hundreds plead at Catteshull and that the king's justices ought to come there for all pleas which should be pleaded therein, that he has royal liberties, as appears in the pleas of the king of quo warranto, that all original writs affecting any tenement within the four crosses of St Edmunds should be delivered to him and that those writs and all other pleas affecting the crown within the four crosses should be pleaded in the town of St Edmunds and this by justices appointed by him. Afterwards the abbot comes and says that the king has writs against him touching all the liberties affecting him and his church. And William de Gyselham testifies the same. De assisis et juratis at Catteshull. The whole county [court] rememers that justices in eyre in that county used to deliver all writs affecting tenements withi the four crosses of St Edmunds to the abbot to be pleaded within the borough by justices whom he chose at his will.

Commission of oyer and terminer to William de Shareshull, Robert de Bracy, William de Chiltenham and Andrew Foliot, on complaint by John prior of the church of St Mary, Worcester, that although that church being a cathedral church of the king's advowson, founded by his progenitors or ancestors of their patrimonies and alms, with various liberties, and the same church with all its precinct is as is well known situated within the hundred of Oswaldeslowe and the liberty of the same annexed to the church, and altogether without the liberty and jurisdiction of the town of Worcester, Simon Gros and Roger le Taverner, bailiffs of the town, and the commonalty thereof, assembling with unwonted clamour came out of the liberty of the town and the bounds of the liberty of the same to the churchyard of the cathedral church and within the liberty of that church, with force and arms and furious onset, and took the body of John son of William le Cartere, who had been killed in the churchyard, without waiting for the coming of the coroner of the county of Worcester to whom it pertained in right of his office to have inquired of the said felony and the malefactors guilty of that death on view of the body before removal, carried it to the town and there, without the liberty of the said church, caused the office of coroner to be done by the coroners of the town and delivered the body to be buried with the rites of the church, and that at divers times they have usurped cognisance of pleas of matters emergent in the priory, without the liberty of the town, that by such continued usurpations they might draw to themselves the places of the priory, the churchyard and precinct, which are within the liberty of the church, a liberty far older than the liberty of the town, and subject these to their liberty; and further that William Verneye, Simon Gros, Gilbert de Havehunt, William Eliot, Walter de Marteleye, John de Wich bocher, Thomas Poukedale, John atte March bowyere, Richard Wyt, Walter son of John de Acton, John de Yeldintre and the commonalty of the same town and others, coming armed to the church and priory, broke the gates of the priory and assaulted his men and servants, whereby he lost their service for a great time, followed and chased him and his monks when they would have defended themselves and their church so far as this might be done without any violation of the peace, shooting with bows and arrows and throwing other weapons at them, to the church and proory, and after a terrible siege of these for a long time brought up fire and tried to fire them, fished and took fish in his several fishery at Bedewardyn and Hallowe, entered his warren at Hallowe, hunted there and carried away hares and rabbits with the fish aforesaid, and perpetrated divers other crimes at the said places.
